Recent Events

"Day of Remembrance: The Japanese American World War II Experience"

Over 30 community members attended a presentation by Peggy Doi, TCJACL Education Committee member, at the Aŋpétu Téča Education Center in Roseville on February 6, 2024.

Peggy volunteered to share her family's WWII experience at a free monthly educational speaker series organized by Roseville Area Senior Programs called "Morning Talks." She scheduled her presentation in February to observe the "Day of Remembrance" and mark the 82nd anniversary of Executive Order 9066, signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt on February 19, 1942. This order resulted in the incarceration, without due process, of both her father's and mother's families from the west coast in the months following Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.

Peggy's mother, Hideko (Peggie) Osasa, was born in Seattle, WA. At the time Executive Order 9066 was issued, her family lived in Port Angeles, WA, but Peggie was on business in Tucson, AZ. When Peggie went to register in Tucson, she was given permission to bypass travel and curfew restrictions to drive back to Port Angeles so that she could be incarcerated with her family. Her family went directly to Tule Lake without first going to an assembly center. At Tule Lake, Peggie was given one of the highest paying jobs, earning \$18/month registering new arrivals. She remained incarcerated until May 1943, when she was granted permission to travel to Minnesota to marry Saburo (Bill) Doi. After the war, Bill and Peggie settled in the Twin Cities and raised their five children.

Peggy's father, Bill, volunteered out of Tule Lake to train as a linguist at the Military Intelligence Service Language School (MISLS) at Camp Savage. Due to a misdiagnosis of tuberculosis, he missed two months of accelerated and intensive Japanese language training. Since he would not be able to catch up, he was offered a position with the Special Services at Camp Savage and Fort Snelling MISLS. In 1948, Bill received an MIS Commendation which read, in part, "You sacrificed opportunities to join your comrades in combat zones and accepted your responsibility as a non-combatant, and the high morale of the men at the MIS Language School was in no small degree due to your contributions as special service clerk."

Bill's experiences during WWII inspired his involvement in advocacy, prompting him to work to repeal Title II which allowed US citizens to be incarcerated without due process, march for fair housing for African Americans, campaign for redress, and establish the Minnesota Nikkei Project. Peggy said that her father believed in the importance of educating the broader community to ensure that what happened during WWII to people of Japanese ancestry, mostly American citizens, would not happen again to any other group that is being singled out. He gave over 200 presentations around the state for this reason. Bill's own father was negatively impacted, as many Issei men were, having lost the role of head of family and decision-maker.

Peggy concluded her presentation with a question, "Why discuss this?" She explained that "all immigrants and indigenous people have a story, each is unique. We need to learn those stories so that we can understand each other." Like her father, she also believes that it is important to educate others so that history does not repeat itself. Her message is especially significant today when the Japanese American community is in a key position to discuss the parallels between Pearl Harbor and 9/11 and to promote understanding through education.

Peggy also acknowledged Sally Sudo, who over the years has shared her first-hand WWII experiences with thousands of students and community members. In 2021, Peggy was one of over a dozen participants in the chapter's "Next Generation" project. During one workshop session, Sally presented her talk on her WWII incarceration experiences. Karen Tanaka Lucas followed with a presentation on how she personalized Sally's PowerPoint to incorporate her own family's story. The project's aim was to provide resources to individuals who may not have first-hand experience so that they could help to fulfill requests for speakers on the Japanese American WWII experience.

Peggy's presentation was well-received and had a positive impact on those who attended. After the program, two grandparents commented that they appreciated gaining an awareness of the MISLS, and that they both planned to take their grandchildren to Historic Fort Snelling Visitor Center this summer. We are fortunate to have chapter members such as Peggy to share their family's experiences and make a difference in our community.

Education Committee Minutes and Updates - April 2024

- Kimmy Tanaka was announced as the new co-chair of the TCJACL Education Committee
- Since a core mission of the committee is to provide talks/presentations on the Japanese American experience during WWII and to raise awareness of the Military Intelligence School at Historic Fort Snelling, three sets of posters provided by Smithsonian Exhibit have been laminated to be used in presentations.
- On April 25, Sally Sudo and John Suzukida will be presenting to about 200 students (in 3 sessions) at Eastview High School in Apple Valley
- Since Rick Shiomi's play about the MIS has an excellent chance to be approved for a possible March/April 2025 run, the Education Committee has agreed to provide an MIS display in the lobby during that time. The display would consist of five pull-up banners (paid for by the Minnesota History Society and the Education Committee) as well as an exhibit case housing memorabilia from that time period.
- As the Chrysanthemum Banquet is scheduled for Saturday, October 5, 2024, the banquet committee is soliciting the names of possible speakers.
- A Reading and Conversation event was held on Saturday, April 6, at the East Side Freedom Library. Sophia Epony Kim shared her work-in-progress, two children's stories about Minnesota Japanese Americans. Discussion followed. Carolyn Nayematsu described the conversation as lively, inspiring, and very meaningful.
